The Coroner said it was only light to state that, directly or indirectly, in connection with the inquiries held into the death of Bridget Gaunon there was not at any time the faintest suggestion against Sergeant Hapilly. The only plat he took in the case was the faising of the body from the water on the morning of the 23rd August, and the bringing afterwards of Margaret Clowry to the station. Nothing in the course of the inquiry transpired that would justify his commiting the very rash act of the previous morning. He was sure they would all agree that the deceased committed suicide during a fit of temporary insanity. He had examined everyone who could throw any light on the matter. Before the report time to take effect the unfortunate man had to ken away his life...

The jury found a verdict in accordance with the terms suggested by the Coroner, adding a rider expressing their deep sympathy with the family of the deceased in the sad calamity that had overtaken them.

The Coroner said he fully endorsed the expression of sympathy from the jury. It was one of the saddest cases he had ever known during his time as Coroner.
