DEATH OF FLEET-SURGEON R. J. BARRY, R.N.

We regret to record the unexpected demise of an eminent Limerick man, Fleet-Surgeon Richard J. Barry, R.N., which took place yesterday at his residence, Bayswater, London, after a short illness. A telegram conveying the sad intelligence was received in town during the day by his brother, Dr. Robert Barry, with whom general sympathy is expressed in his sorrow. The deceased had a very long and distinguished service, extending as it did to twenty two years during which time he was stationed in various parts of the world—Bermuda and South Atlantic, Mediterranean, and the Bosphorous. He retired some two or three years ago on the full pension of his rank. Many friends in Limerick who knew Surgeon Barry from the time of his schooldays will deeply regret to hear the news of his premature death.
