COACHMAN'S CLAIM FOR WAGES.

Yesterday, before Mr. Justice Gibson, and a
common jury, the case of Bourke v O'Connell was
decided. It was an action brought by Richard
Bourke, who had been in the employment of the
defendant as a coachman for balance of
wages. The defendant is a magistrate re-
siding at Ballylean, County Clare. The ac-
counts were of a most complicated character,
and both parties consented to the discharge of the
jury and to have the account taken by the judge.
His lordship found that there was a balance due to
the plaintiff of £25 8s., and he gave judgment
accordingly for plaintiff with costs.

ANOTHER DEATH FROM BURNS

Another death of a child from burns, the third
which has taken place in Limerick this week,
occurred this morning. Mary Anne Bourke, aged
4 years, while in her parents' house at Park some-
how or other got near a pot of boiling water on
Wednesday evening, and was frightfully scalded
all over the body. She was conveyed to Bar-
rington's Hospital, where the little sufferer suc-
cumbed to the injuries this morning. It was not
deemed necessary to hold an inquest.

DEATH OF MRS. PAGE THROWER.

death of Mrs. C. E. Page Thrower, which oc-
curred on Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Page Thrower
was taken suddenly ill at her residence, 102 Lower
Mount street, and was removed in the ambulance
to the Adelaide Hospital, where life was pro-
nounced extinct. She was well known in mu-
sical circles in Dublin, and the public at large
knew her mainly through her connection with the
Hallé Concerts, which she arranged for many
seasons.
