REMARKABLE LIVING CENTENARIAN.

Our Abbeyfeale correspondent says:—Mrs. Ellen Reidy, who still resides at Old Chapel street, Abbeyfeale, is one of those whose interesting reminiscences range from the early part of the last century. Born in the year before the '98 rebellion her memory still retains impressions of many striking historical events which occurred shortly afterwards. Her recollections of the exploits of Captain Rock, the leader of the Rockites in 1819, whose headquarters were situate in the then unfrequented slopes of the Cralloe mountains of West Limerick, and the White Boy raids of '21 and '22 are still vividly clear. Incidents connected with the part taken by West Limerick in the '48 movement are also indelibly fixed in her memory. Unlike most centenarians whose biographical sketches credit them with robust health to the last, Mrs Reidy has not enjoyed good health for some months past, while documentary proofs of the accuracy of her age are in the possession of Mr. D. Leahy, solicitor, in whose family much of her time has been spent.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN HUGH COX.

Tidings have been received from America of the premature demise of Mr. John Hugh Cox, only son of Mrs. R. Cox, Ballinamona House, Ballingarry, which event occurred on the 12th instant, at the early age of 41 years, at his late residence, 1129, Lafayette's Avenue, Brooklyn. The news has been received by the people in Ballingarry and the surrounding districts with genuine regret and heartfelt sympathy for Mrs. Cox, his grief-stricken parent, Mrs. Frank Maher and Miss Bertie Cox, his sisters, as well as the deceased's wife and children and numerous relatives on their sad bereavement.

a most interesting trip. It was perhaps the first time that there was an excursion from this city to Clifden. Therefore it was new ground to most Limerick people, and they were highly delighted with the bold, rugged, and majestic scenery which met their gaze. Towering high into the clouds were the celebrated Twelve Pins of Connemara, a capital view of which was had either from Clifden or Recess, the station immediately before it. It need hardly be remarked that cyclists explored the surrounding country, paying, amongst other places, a visit to Kylemore Castle, the palatial seat of Mr. Mitchell Henry. There was, in connection with the trip, one incident which marred the enjoyment of the day. The train arrived in Ennis at 11.10 p.m. (somewhat late), and here a most unexpected and vexatious delay occurred. Through some cause or other there was a shortage of water in the engine tank, with the result that it was a quarter to one a.m. before the engine was in a position to resume the journey to Limerick. It was something like 2.15 o'clock when the passengers stepped on to the platform, the train being considerably over two hours late. Some sixty passengers went on the excursion from Limerick, but large contingents were picked up along the journey, with the result that finally there were fully five hundred passengers altogether.
