HARBOUR BOARD NOMINATIONS.

The nominations for the election of five representatives of the importers and exporters on the Harbour Board closed yesterday with the Secretary, Mr. John Boyd. The following gentlemen were nominated—Messrs John F. Power, F. C. Cleeve, J. H. Roche, W. Holliday, John Hayes, and R. Twyford. The first four are retiring Commissioners, and the fifth, Mr. E. J. Long, resigns. There being six candidates, a contest becomes necessary, and the ballot will be open from 12 o'clock to-morrow until three p.m. The nomination of five representatives of the Harbour ratepayers will close to-morrow, and the contest, if any, takes place on Friday.

DEATH OF MR. F. T. FINCH.

We deeply regret to record the death of an old and esteemed citizen, Mr. Frederick T. Finch, which took place very suddenly at his residence, the Crescent, yesterday afternoon about four o'clock. Mr. Finch had been out during the day, and some time after his return home he became suddenly unwell, and although medical aid at once arrived, he was beyond all that human skill could avail, and in fact, it is stated, had already passed away before the doctor arrived. The deceased gentleman, who was about 65 years of age, was a widower. He was for many years principal-cashier in the firm of Messrs J. N. Russell. A courteous and charitable gentleman, he took a most kindly interest in local benevolent institutions, the Protestant Aid Society in particular, of which he was one of the oldest Committee men. He was also Treasurer of the Limerick Branch of the Soldiers and Sailors Families Association, and during the progress of the war took a most active part in the working of that excellent institution. Mr. Finch, who was brother of Colonel Finch, of Maryville, Croom, was a member of a very old County Limerick family, and throughout the county the news of his demise will be heard of with sincere regret. Mr. Finch had been in delicate health for sometime past. The funeral takes place for the Cathedral on Thursday morning at nine o'clock.
