### THE KILRUSH FORESHORE.

The claim of Mr. Hector S. Vandeleur for rates for the use of the foreshore of Kilrush, which is being contested in the High Court before the Master of the Rolls by Messrs Henry R. Glynn, and Wm. Glynn, was heard on Thursday, and continued again yesterday, the case being still at hearing.

The official returns as to the number of deaths from cholera in Palestine during the week ending yesterday are: 318 deaths at Gaza, 121 at Lyda, 3 at Jaffa, 15 at Hejibrum (?). Jerusalem is free of cholera. All the victims are natives.

The Intermediate Education Commissioners have met and determined to revise the marks of the students examined at the recent examinations. The result of their decision is that the pass standard will be reduced from 40 to 30 per cent.

## THE SAD DEATH OF A NEWCASTLE MAN.

Dr. John M. Ambrose, coroner, held an inquest on Thursday evening at Barna Railway Station, touching the death of Michael McEnery, of Chapel Street, Newcastle West, who travelled by the train from Abbeyfeale, due at Newcastle West at 8 p.m., and whose body was found by the Night-watchman near the entrance to Barna tunnel, and who died a few hours after being discovered, as reported in our Thursday's issue.

Head Constable Brady acted on behalf of the police.

Mr. John Condon, solicitor, appeared in the interests of the Railway Company.

The evidence of Dr. George Pierce showed the deceased had several bones broken, and that he died from shock.

The evidence of several witnesses tended to show that the deceased got out of the train on the off-side to avoid the guard as he had no ticket, and on the guard shouting to him he jumped off the footboard and ran towards the tunnel where he was found. It was surmised that the deceased attempted to get into the train after it had started, and the doors being all fastened that he was thrown off. The jury returned a verdict of death from shock consequent on the injuries received.
