DEATH OF MR. AUBREY DE VERE.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Aubrey De Vere, LL.D., the well-known poet, and a distinguished county Limerick gentleman, which took place last night at the family seat, Curraghchase, Adare. Mr. De Vere was in his 88th year. He had been in failing health for some time past, but was able to move about up to a few days ago. Of late years Mr. De Vere had resided at great deal at Curraghchase. He was beloved by all who had the pleasure of knowing him either as a man of letters or as a true and sterling friend, and his death, though he had long passed the allotted span, is deeply regretted. The deceased gentleman was third son of the late Sir Aubrey De Vere, and brother of Sir Stephen E. De Vere, the 4th and present baronet, with whom the deepest sympathy is felt in his great bereavement. The De Vere family are connected with the houses of Inchiquin and Montague and various leading county families.

Aubrey Thomas De Vere (born 1814), poet and political writer, was the son of the late Sir Aubrey De Vere, Bart., of County Limerick, the author of the picturesque drama, "Mary Tudor." He was educated at Trinity College, Dublin, and made his first appearance in the realms of poetry with "The Waldenses, or the Fall of Rova; a Lyrical Tale," in 1842. Next year he brought out "Searches after Proserpine," and ten years later a volume of "Poems, Miscellaneous and Sacred." Mr. De Vere was most at home on Irish themes. In "The Legends of St. Patrick" (1872) he discourses on the precepts—to love, to forgive, to endure, and to contend for the right. "Legends of the Saxon Saints" (1879) takes us back from this age of subjective poetry, where the author thought we had remained too long, to times of storm and change, when faith in God, stronger for persecution, shows out more triumphantly. Mr. De Vere, in the "Foray of Queen Meade, and other Legends of Ireland's Heroic Age" (1882), followed Sir Samuel Ferguson in his treatment of the grand and half-barbaric period with which he dealt. Here he did for the heroic lore of the Celt what Mr. William Morris has accomplished for that of the Teuton. His chief poem substantially embodies the story told in the "Tain bo Cuailgne." His sympathy with Roman Catholicism gave these poems a peculiar sincerity of tone. Mr. De Vere also published several other poems. He was the author of several political works:—"English Misrule and Irish Misdeeds" (1848), "The Church Establishment of Ireland" (1867), "The Church Settlement of Ireland" (1868), "Constitutional and Unconstitutional Political Action" (1881), etc.; and he contributed occasionally to the periodicals.

THE JESUIT CHURCH.

The feast of the Holy Name was celebrated in the Jesuit Church on Sunday last with special solemnity, the ceremony being of a most impressive and imposing character. The Most Rev. FUNERAL OF MR. AUBREY DE VERE.

Yesterday the grave closed over the mortal remains of Mr. Aubrey De Vere, whose death marks the disappearance from the literary world of a star the lustre of which will long illumine the hearts and minds of men. A visit to Curraghchase on Friday morning was to those who had intimately known the distinguished poet and litterateur, a melancholy one. The chill January blasts had ceased their angry moan and nature for the time being seemed shrouded in the mantle of sorrow. A gloom of sadness hung all round, save and except a short carol from the robin on the leafless tree or the shrill noise of the wild fowl in the lake beneath, while around the residence groups of the tenantry and old retainers on the estate were having a friendly gossip on some kind act (of the many) of the deceased, who was ever on the most cordial terms with the people of the locality. The remains enclosed in a heavily polished oak coffin lay in the study adjoining the front hall, and at ten o'clock were borne on the shoulders of six of the workmen to the hearse, and thence the cortege proceeded slowly through the long winding avenue to the family burial ground at Askeaton, a distance of four miles. Some sixty of the tenantry and labourers on the estate marched after the hearse the entire distance, and at each cross road en route to the Church large numbers of country people joined the cortege. A party of Constabulary under the charge of Sergeant Kennedy, Askeaton, also accompanied the remains. At the grave side the last prayers were recited by the Very Rev. Dean Flanagan, the life long friend of the deceased. It was the wish of the deceased to be buried in an open grave and not in the family vault adjoining where for generations the De Vere family have been interred.
