DEATH OF MR. TOM JOYCE.

His numerous friends in the city and county of Limerick, and indeed in many commercial centres in the kingdom, will hear with much regret of the unexpected death of Mr Tom Joyce, buyer in the silk department of Messrs Todd and Co., William street. He had been but a few days ill, and passed away last evening at the early age of 37 years. Mr Joyce was a great favourite in Limerick—his courteous and happy manner having won for him the est em of everyone with whom he came in contact, whether privately or publicly, and it may be remarked that in his business he could not be excelled. His name is well known amongst the elite of this district, for in the arrangement of many public and private events be took an active and prominent part. His taste and skill in all matters appertaining to bis department were proverbial, and it was universally recognised that under his supervision the decoration of a church for a marriage ceremony, or the arrangement of a ball-room, was in competent hand.
