

who kept the house in roars of laughter, and the part in such a manner that plainly he was no tyro at the business. His was admirable,—no impeding locomotion of coat tails,—the *patois* quite native-like, acting full of sparkle and fun, never towards the vulgar, but keeping well to the point without any straining after clap-trap, too, in a way that would have done every an old hand. Miss I. Bird, in the *role* of "a," enjoyed a sort of sinecure, and had to the burlesque to give proof of her ability. Mrs. Croker made the most—a trifle too w and then, perhaps—of "Lord Plato," a very happy illustration of the Platonic and Mr. T. Gloster, having got rid of the which clung to him at the outset, did it as "Captain Blenheim." The burlesque "The Maid and the Magpie" followed, and fresh laurels for the performers. Mrs. Pery's rendering of "Fernando Villabella"—the old father of melo-drama, and the "aged" of "Ninette"—was excellent, and contributed no small measure, as did her acting in "Joe," to the undoubted success of the entertainment. The Hon. Mrs. Pery as "Lucie" and Miss G. Croker as "Dame Lucie" were then equal to the task allotted to them in their respective roles, and they got through their work in the happiest way imaginable, added to the more by the charming, artistic manner in which they rendered the music incidental to the drama. Indeed, their vocalism in the once popular "Come where my love lies dreaming," was a pleasure that one does not hear every day, and it did the possession of that innate faculty of vocalaries of the science of sweet sounds which we are they can rightly appreciate the unalloyed pleasures which Euterpe can impart to the human mind. Miss Inez's performance in the "Magistrate" was quite as fussy, and needlessly officious, and quite as full disrepute towards homily manufacture, as any modern performance of the bench could well be. The poetess described her to be "the plague in ordinary village," but there was nothing plagu-ous about her acting. She did her part in fine style, and for no small share of applause. The Hon. Mrs. Pery's "Gianetto" went very smoothly and well; and Mr. Gloster's "Fabrizio" showed that he was more at ease in burlesque than in light
