It gives Colonel Nedham much pain that the time has come for him to say “Good Bye” to the Regiment; he offers to the officers commanding, the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men, of the Tipperary Artillery Militia, his best wishes, for their health, happiness, and prosperity and a safe and speedy journey to the county of Tipperary which has just cause to be proud of its distinguished Regiment of Artillery.
