that on Sunday afternoon, at half-past four o'clock, John Brown, a friend of the deceased, called at his lodgings and brought him out for a walk. They visited a publichouse in King-street, where the deceased had two half glasses of whiskey. Afterwards they went to another publichouse in Wicklow street, where the deceased had about five or more half glasses of whiskey. This was all he had, with the exception of one bottle of stout at his dinner and a bottle of stout which he drank in Dundrum. The deceased and Brown then proceeded homewards, the former being in a helpless condition. He fell on the pavement and cut his forehead, not very severely. Brown then got some tradesmen who were passing at the time to help him to take the young man home, where he was put to bed in his room. He died in about twenty minutes aft- wards. Dr Keys, South Circular Road, deposed that he was called in to the young man, whom he found in a moribund condition. He made a *post mortem* examination, and found that the cause of death was congestion of the brain, brought on by drink and accelerated by the fall in the street. The jury returned a verdict accordingly.
