

THE GLENSHARROLD TENANTS.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR A SETTLEMENT.

We understand that a deputation from the Glensharrold tenants accompanied by Father Walsh, P.P., and Father Ambrose, C.C., met the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, at the Diocesan College this morning at eleven o'clock, and were in conference until half past three with a view to a settlement of the dispute which is now so long pending. Mr Murphy, Head Receiver to the Court, and the Very Rev Dr Moloney, V.G., were also present. The tenants offered £100 in full satisfaction of all arrears to the 1st of August last (last gale day), and to leave the fixing of future rents to Mr E. W. O'Brien, D.L., and Mr Charles Curling. Mr Murphy took a note of the proposal with the intention, it is said, of submitting it to the Receiver Judge for his consideration. The tenants speak in grateful terms of the action of the Bishop in taking up the controversy. No definite conclusion, it will be seen, has yet been arrived at.
