ESTATE OF THE LATE MAJOR GAVIN.

On Saturday, before the Master of the Rolls, the case of Russell v. Gavin came on. It was a suit to administer the estate of the late Major George O'Halloran Gavin, of Kilpeacon, in the County Limerick. The plaintiffs were Mrs Anna Maria Russell and the trustees of her marriage settlement, and the defendants were Mr Mont. ford Westropp Gavan. The case came before the court for the consideration of certain questions arising on the Chief Clerk's certificate. sitting of the court it was announced that the case had been settled, on the terms that the trustees should be declared liable to bring in £1,900 and £600 mentioned in the certificate, and that Mr M W Gavin he declared liable to bring in £173 and £387 9s 8d, and thereupon be entitled to those sums, reserving all questions as to the liability of settled lands after the payment of the balance of £10,000 mentioned in the will and as to the rights, if any, which the executors' a d trustees in respect of this balance of £1,000 and the sum of £600 should have as against the defendant, Montiford Gavin, and his property, and directing a sale of Kilpeacon House, offices, and demesne, and giving leave to M W Gavin to bring in any offers, and directing the proceedings to be amended by making the eldest proceedings to be amended by making the eldest son of M W Gavin a defendant. CHARITABLE BEQUESTS.

The will of the late Major William Hamner retired from her Majesty's army), who died on May 26, has been proved at the Principal Probate Registry, the value of the personality amounting to £105,000. For religious and charitable purposes, the testator leaves £400 to the National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor in the principles of the Church of England; £300 each to the Bishop of London's Fund and the East London Church Fund; and £100 to the Church of England Central Society for Providing Homes for Waifs and Strays. These legacies are to be paid from funds at the London and Westminster Bank, the residue of which is to be equally divided between Charing Cross, George's, and the Brompton (Consumption) Hospital.
