DEATH OF MR MICHAEL HARTIGAN.

We announce this evening with much regret the demise of Mr Michael Hartigan, of 46, George-street, who passed away at his residence this morning after a lengthened illness. No citizen was better known in Limerick during the forty years he had been before the public. As an auctioneer he was justly celebrated, and to call him "the Tattersall of Ireland" would not be too flattering. A talented and clever business-man, those who had dealings with him found him fair and upright. He enjoyed the support of a large circle of business connections, was a thorough judge of his business, and as well known in England as in Ireland. His cheerful manner always secured for him a warm welcome and the best company, and no more jovial companion could well be found. In the horse trade Mr Hartigan was still more notable, and for upwards of forty years he carried on a most successful business in this department. At one time he had quite a monopoly of the south of Ireland, and had most extensive dealings with the Governments in the purchase and supply of remount horses, not to speak of the character he bore for supplying Irish hunters of the right stuff. Indeed, any detailed account of Mr Hartigan's career would be unnecessary, so well known and so popular was he amongst all classes of the public in Limerick and surrounding counties. In his demise a familiar figure has passed away, and one whose name will long live green in the public mind. The funeral will leave 46, George-street on Sunday morning at nine o'clock for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.
