GOOD FRIDAY.

The day, in general, was observed as a holiday, and business was suspended in the various establishments throughout the city—commercial, legal, and otherwise, while the limited hours of Sunday work at the postal and telegraph offices were only observed. At the City Petty Sessions, the disposal of the numerous cases entered for adjudication none of which by the way were of a serious nature, were adjourned for a week, and the publichouse regulations peculiar to Sunday were practically observed. FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. PATRICK HOGAN.

The funeral of this highly esteemed and much lamented gentleman took place yesterday. The cortege was one of the largest and most representative seen in Limerick for a considerable time, and amply testified to the esteem and respect in which the deceased and his friends have been held by the citizens of all classes. The sad event of his sudden demise intensified the deep regret manifested by all classes, and elicited expressions of sympathy for the bereavement of his family. The remains were removed from the deceased's late residence in Newenham street, at 10 o'clock, and placed in a hearse in waiting and conveyed to the family burial ground at Mount St Lawrence. The coffin was of polished oak, with brass mountings, and literally strewn with flowers and *immortelles*.

GREAT FIRE IN NEW YORK.

THE WILCOX LARD REFINERY BURNED
New York, Saturday.
The conflagration at Messrs W J Wilcoxon and Co's lard refinery in Fifty-ninth street, on the North river, which is leased by Messrs Fabbanks and Bossiter, extended for half a mile along the river front. Several storehouses, elevators, and much dock property belonging to the New York Railway Company were destroyed, the loss being estimated at 3,000,000 dols. Ten persons were killed.

ACCIDENT TO MR FLOWER, M.P.

The Press Association flows off correspondent telegraphs that Mr Cyril Flower, M.P. yesterday afternoon was riding along the sash at Cromer, when a dog flew at the horse's leg. The horse kicked out, and Mr Flower was unseated, but managed to retain the reins. The dog again attacked the horse, which in kicking the second time struck Mr Flower in the forehead, lacerating the flesh over the eye. The member's injury was dressed at Cromer, and is hoped no evil effects will follow.

FATAL BOAT ACCIDENT AT WARRINGTON REGATTA.

The Press Association's Warrington correspondent telegraphs—The annual regatta of the Warrington Sailing Club took place to-day, and a number of boats left Widnes last night in preparation for the event. One of them, the *Sar Ann*, containing nine persons, was caught by gust of wind, and the sail being made fast, capsized. Three of the occupants, Elizabeth Taylor Jones, aged 13, George Anworth, 14, and Thomas Duckworth, 23, were drowned, and the father of Jones was with difficulty resuscitated.
