

request remained unanswered. There is only one frigate in our roads, and six is without her complement of men; the Commander in Chief keeps all within his camp. The Brigands took Miragoane, but only kept it a few hours; they are now scattered among the Mountains du Rochelais: from Port-au-Prince to L'Anse a Veau all is left; all is burned in the vicinity of Port-au-Prince; the districts of Plaisance, Gonaves, Denney, and the whole plain of L'Arbitronie, are a prey to infurrection; and the blacks massacre the whites and the people of colour without mercy; they have abundance of ammunition; they are supplied by Desfilines and the other black leaders who remained in commission.—The blacks fire every night at our posts, and kill our sentries.

"There are no more white troops; they have all perished through wretchedness and fatigue; the sailors have experienced the same fate.

"All those who came from France for the purpose of reforming the Colony, have brought with them the principles of Poverel and Santonax; the General in Chief was the worst man who could be sent; he is too fond of money, &c."

"Cape Town, October 25.

"Take care not to come here as you proposed; the Colony is ruined, lost" General Leclerc is at his last shift (*aux abois*). He has had Fort Dauphin, Port de Paix, and all the neighbourhood of the Cape evacuated. We are threatened by a numerous army of revolted Negroes. Not conceiving himself safe here, he has ordered all the great guns to be spiked, in order to be ready to embark immediately. Could it be ultimately found necessary; all the private houses and magazines are shut up; all the women and children, in fine, those who are incapable of bearing arms are on the sea shore with what they could have from the wreck of their property. Cape Town, Port-au-Prince, and Les Cayes, are the only ports in possession of the French."

Jan. 13.—We are sorry to learn that the reports respecting Hoodaras have more foundation than was at first apprehended. Some of the most respectable mercantile houses have received advice from thence, that the Spaniards have sent notice that the British settlers must quit, or they will be expelled by force. Our privilege of cutting logwood is of course at an end. This intelligence is doubted, as no notice of the kind has been received from the Spanish government, but the non-renewal of former treaties at Amiens, putting a period to any claim we had to this indulgence, the Spaniards, we suppose, think nothing more is necessary than to give us notice that they mean to carry the measures, which that treaty authorizes, into effect. Ministers cannot oppose the Spaniards on this point, though particular branches of the manufactures and commerce of this country must suffer.

Yesterday the Frenchmen, who are in custody on a charge of forging the French national currency, underwent a long examination before Sir R. Ford, at the Secretary of State's Office.

Cork, Jan. 7.—Yesterday a most excellent sermon was preached in Christ-Church, by the Rev. J. W. Ormsby, in aid of the funds of the House of Industry, when a collection of 125l. 12s. 11d. and a pair of gold ear-rings, was made.
