the best talents at the Bar, and all performing their
respective functions, under the controul of a Judge,
not more distinguished for his learning, than his
perseverity, his firmness, than his humanity and
moderation.

If no less than ten capital convictions have taken
place before such a Tribunal, it is the greatest con-
solation to the humane mind, that the shadow of a
doubt cannot attach to the merit of those convictions.

We must do the Solicitor General justice, for the
candour with which he proceeded in every one
of the trials.

In proceeding Col. Bouchier's men he admit-
ted, that several people had been obliged to join in
that attack by compulsion of the principals,—and
declaring, that those men being under coercion,
were exempt from any criminality; he profecuted
the principals upon their evidence—but it would be
absurd to convict the instruments upon the evidence
of the principals, and then turn the principals loose
upon the country;—on this trial the two prisoners
were capitally convicted, as before stated.

On Monday last, by the unimpeachable con-
viction of four men for whipping Mr. Green's Stew-
ard, the deluded people of this country, have been,
for the first time taught the awful lesson, that a
crime of this sort, is punishable with death;—and
the same lesson was repeated on Tuesday in the
conviction and sentence passed on two more for the
whipping of Mr. Roke's steward.

On Wednesday, Morogh Ahern was convicted
for the murder of Messrs. John Boland, James
Boland, Mathew Boland, Edward Boland, and
James Boland, jun. on the night of the 7th of
March, 1803. This man appeared to have been a
principal in that bloody scene; the learned Judge
said, in pronouncing sentence, that he never felt
so little pain in discharging this awful part of his
duty; and a sentiment of satisfaction seemed to
pervade the whole Court, at seeing a Principal
in that massacre convicted, though at the end
of three years, in so satisfactory a manner:—Upon
this trial a very extraordinary circumstance occur-
red,—a man, who admitted to have been present
at the massacre, appeared as a witness for the pri-
soner at the bar—but as this man's fate is yet un-
decided, we shall abstain from all commentary as
to him, only to observe, that we hear his defence
is, that he was forced to the massacre by Patrick
Ahern, who sought revenge against Boland, then
a Tyrant Professor; Boland having sold a cow of
Ahern's under a decree, for tythes obtained against
him in the Civil-Bill Court.—Whether this man
was under coercion or not, may hereafter appear;
but it is now unquestionably true, that the dreadful
carnage of the Bolands' was occasioned by the cir-
cumstances above stated.

The same day a most salutary example took
place in the conviction of one Mortell, for perjury,
who after having given informations of a most fer-
ocious outrage, contradicted every word of those in-
formations, upon the trial at the last sittings.

On Thursday Michael Carrol was acquitted after
a trial which lasted seven hours, for entering by
night, the house of Thomas Hanrahan, of Glin,
and hogging the said Hanrahan, in consequence of
some informations he gave the Knight of Glin.

We cannot close this article without paying a
tribute to the severe patience with which Mr.
Baron Smith, during eight days painful investiga-
tion, tried every cause, and scrutinized every fact.

—But above all, for the exemplary diligence with
which he laboured every circumstance, that tended
in the slightest degree to evince the innocence of
the prisoners, being in fact what the Constitution in
theory requires him to be, Advocate; for the unhappy
men who stood at his bar.—In paying him this
tribute, we do not pretend not to speak our own senti-
ments; for we know that we speak the sentiments
of the country.
