Northern Coasts of the Island.

Accounts have been received by a vessel arrived
at Hull from Hamburg, that a body of French
troops took possession of Bremen on the 2d instant.
The accounts add that another column was march-
ing for Hamburg. The first part of this intelli-
gence will probably be confirmed, but Prussia can
hardly be expected to allow the French to take
possession of Hamburg. No accounts have been
received this day from the Continent to enable us
to contradict or confirm these statements. We are
convinced that as the French pay little regard either
to the faith of Treaties or to the rights of Neutra-
lity, they will endeavour to occupy every port in
the North of Germany, in order to embarrass our
commerce, unless prevented by the interference of
Prussia and Russia.—As such a measure would be
a great detriment to the trade of these powers, and
particularly that of the former, we still entertain
hopes that they will not be so blind to their own
interests as to remain tame spectators of such a vio-
lation of justice.

We understand that the plan for the Defence of
the Country is nearly completed, and will soon be
laid before Parliament. We hope it will be ade-
quate to its purpose, and that we have but little doubt of
its receiving the hearty support of the whole empire.

Mr. Wickham's Motion for the introduction of
a Bill tending to appropriate a surplus fund in Ire-
land in loans to Clergymen of that Country for the
purpose of rebuilding Parsonage Houses, is defer-
ring the utmost patronage of Government, as it will
contribute highly to facilitate the diffusion of mor-
tality and religion in that branch of the Empire.
The Clergy being better accommodated, will be
more zealous in the discharge of their duty, parti-
cularly if the legislative provision in question should
be extended to the rebuilding of the Churches.
