**SUDDEN DEATH ON BOARD THE VANDELEUR.—**  
Last evening the s.s. "Vandeur" was about leaving Kilrush for Limerick, when Mr M'Inerney, a returned American, who resided at Meslick, Co. Clare, died rather suddenly. He, however, had been seriously ill, and expressed his desire to get home at once, having been in Kilkee for some time for the benefit of his health. The brother of the deceased was present when the sad event occurred, and had the body conveyed to Limerick forthwith. The coroner decided there was no necessity for holding an inquest, death being due to natural debility.

**RURAL SANITARY BOARD.**  
The usual monthly meeting of the Rural Sanitary Board was held to-day in the board room of the Workhouse, Mr Edmond Ryan, presiding. There were also present—Mr Noonan, Timothy Raleigh, John McIner Hayes, John Egan, Michael Laffin, Timothy, Roger Moloney, and Brian Kennedy. The minutes of the previous meeting had been read by the Clerk (Mr Guinane), were approved. The Chairman inquired if the cottage more, which had been left in an unfinished state by the contractor, Mr Gleeson, had been completed.

Mr Hayes said that he had taken the responsibility of having the cottage completed, and he had gone to the place, and had seen that the undertaking had been carried out satisfactorily. They should be very thankful to Mr Ryan, solicitor, for having advanced £5 out of his pocket towards its completion.

With reference to the condition of the brood graveyard, the Clerk said that the Church Board had communicated with on the subject. The Chairman said that the matter had been further impressed upon them. The place was in a disgraceful condition. The Board had spent a long time on the matter.

The suggestion was agreed to. With reference to the balance of a c. Board of Works Inspector, Mr Abley had reported on inspection of cottages under the Lab. Act, which amounted to over £16.

A communication was read from the Department, which stated that directions had been given that the necessary proceedings should be taken against the guardians for the recovery of the sum if it was not paid. It was understood by the Department that the Board had no response on the subject, and they should claim on the grounds that in their personal inspection of the sites was not sufficient. Such was necessary, as it was not expected that the inspector could acquaint himself with the places without visiting them personally. The expenses were reasonable, and the Board were authorising the proceedings provided for indemnifying them against a claim which might be incurred by the application of an arbitrator.
