 Gladstone, speaking in Aberdeen last night, speaking in Aberdeen last night against the folly of abandoning principles and principles, and emphasizing Home Rule policy embodied in the Bill to be futile, abandoned by their being replaced by new or better proposals. Mr Gladstone credit for emphasizing his country and for unrivalled declared that as a tactical leader he had been less conspicuous. Thrice he had led the Liberal party to defeat, and on the fourth occasion was shattered beyond hope of recovery. The English people had a right to demand an account for his misuse of power committed to him in the leadership of the Liberal party, and to demand whom he was now leading. He was to be free of the feuds and prejudices in Ireland, and to give every extravagant fad in England a fair chance to gain supporters. Any policy that cannot stand on its own justification notwithstanding its past wrong, but actual nature and future benefit. Now Gladstonian policy is negative and obstructive. Lord Salisbury justified the attempt to solve the University question.
