THE FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late Mr. Herbert took place
to-day, and was one of the largest and most
representative that has been seen in the city for
many years. The remains were removed from
St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church at 11.30
o'clock for interment in the family burial ground
at St. Mary's Cathedral. No more convincing
proof could be given of the great respect in which
the deceased was held in the city than by the
exceedingly large numbers who joined in the
procession as a last tribute of regard
for the memory of an old and valued
citizen. The members and officers of the
Corporation walked behind the chief mourners,
but the Mayor, who was represented by Alderman
John O'Brien, was unavoidably absent, having to
leave town this morning to attend the funeral of
an uncle. There was a large representation
from the Arch Confraternity of the Holy Family,
of which society the deceased was a very old and
prominent member. The Odd Fellows' Society,
with which the late Mr. Herbert was connected
since '49, were also fully represented.

ENNIS INTIMIDATION.

QUESTION IN THE HOUSE.

The following ten defendants were lodged in
the Limerick Male District Prison late on Satur-
day, having been conveyed by mail train from
Ennis under a strong constabulary escort: Joseph
Hickey, Clare Castle; Wm. Kelly, do; Patrick
Clancy, Marcus Harmond, Thos. Hennessy, Bernard
O'Brien, Daniel O'Brien, Bernard Lynch, James
Lynch, and William Reidy. The accused are all
farmers or business people from the Clarecastle
district, and they were sentenced to three months'
imprisonment, in default of bail, on a charge of
intimidation. The prosecutions were brought
under the Coercion Act, and the defendants de-
cided on going to gaol rather than give any bail
whatever. They were visited yesterday by the
Mayor and Mr. John Guinane, J.P. Arrange-
ments have been made by the Clare friends of the
accused for supplying them with their meals
during the running of the term to which they
have been sentenced.

In the House of Commons last night, the Chief

BOER "IRISH" BRIGADE.

DEATH OF A LIMERICK MAN IN THE TRANSVAAL.

News of the death of Mr. Thomas Naughton,
formerly of Fillisten, Adare, who some seven or
eight years since emigrated to America, and who
joined the Irish Brigade under Colonel Blake,
when the South African war broke out, was lately
received by his father, through members of the
family in America. When the Irish Brigade
broke up, young Naughton attached himself to
General Botha's commando, and fought in many
of the engagements under this General. Young
Naughton was a fine specimen of an Irishman.
He was only 27 years of age, and stood close on
6ft. The news of his death has caused a shock to
his poor father and friends, for whom the great-
est sympathy is felt through the city and county
of Limerick, as they are much respected people.

INTIMIDATION PROSECUTIONS.

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S SNUB.

In the House of Commons last night,
Mr. Joyce (for Mr. O'Mara) said—I beg to ask
the Chief Secretary whether he is aware that a
prosecution was brought against Mr. J. B. Walsh,
of Callan, County Kilkenny, under 1 and 2 Wil-
liam 4, c. 44, s. 3, for alleged circulation of an
intimidatory letter; and whether he will state
the reason why Mr. Walsh was not proceeded
against under a more recent measure?

The Attorney-General—I will reply to this
question. The provisions of the Crimes Act
recently availed of dealt exclusively with riot and
unlawful assembly. The crime of which the ac-
cused is charged is that of sending a threatening
letter. The reason why Mr. Walsh was not pro-
secuted under the procedure recently adopted is
that sending a threatening letter is not, in point
of law, either a riot or an unlawful assembly.
