LONDON CATTLE MARKET, this day—310 beasts, dull, 2s 4d to 4s 8d; 1,100 sheep, steady, 3s 4d to 6s 4d; 30 calves, 3s 8d to 5s 8d per 8 lbs. 20 milch cows, £16 to £26 per head.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET, this day—Smaller number of beef exhibits, but increased supply of sheep; trade quieter all round, and prices hard to support in face of bad English reports. Beef, 4s 6d to 6s 6d per cwt; mutton, 6½d to 8½d per lb, and 8½d extreme; pigs 2s to 3s per cwt cheaper.

BRISTOL CATTLE MARKET, this day—At our market to-day we had a moderate supply of beef, which was sufficient for the trade; prices ranged from 56s to 63s per cwt. About the average number of sheep penned; trade was not brisk, at from 8d to 9½d. Demand for pigs was small, at from 9s to 9s 9d. Useful kinds of store cattle were readily disposed of at late rates.
