

George Foster prosecuted Roger M'Mahon for setting traps in the ruins on his Ballykennan, contrary to the Ground Act. The lands are preserved by Mr. and his gamekeeper looks after them. It seems the old man has been blind, and that after the assault he went to a workhouse where his life was in danger for some time. Evidence was given for the fact that the man, being under the influence of drink, and sustained the injury complained of, and the accused was sentenced to 14 days' imprisonment.

Richard Keogh was prosecuted by District Inspector McDonnell for assaulting his brother. It appears that he accused his brother and mother of sleeping with him awake at night, and on the question, about a fortnight ago he got up and destroyed some furniture, and assaulted his brother. Sent to jail for one month.

A number of cases for drunkenness and prosecution under the Dogs Act were disposed of on the day.

Mr. Keogh having called attention to the danger of explosives used in the district for agricultural and other purposes, suggested that the appointment of an inspector would be an advisable measure.

Adam, Clerk of Petty Sessions was unanimously appointed to the office.
