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A MODERN SLAVE TRADER

FOLLOWING HIS election as Mayor of Limerick, Thady Coughlan was invited to attend a party given by his employer to celebrate the election (or, more accurately, "selection") success.

But the employer concerned is no ordinary employer. He is Sean Hurley, a millionaire who lives like a modern rural squire at Ballymackeogh House, Newport, Co. Tipperary. Hurley's main firm is called WELL-TRADE MIDDLE EAST COMPANY.

There is a name known as "Lumper" used in the building industry to describe a man who hires workers on a labour-only basis and is given a lump sum to carry out the work and to pay the workers. Hurley could be described as a "Master Lumper", who operates on a global scale.

His method of securing many of his contracts in foreign countries is to set up bogus or "front" companies which operate from his own house at Ballymackeogh. One such company is T.W.H. (MAINTENANCE) LTD. The nominal "Managing Director" of this "company" is Michael Hayes, a "personal assistant" to Like his fellow-employee, Thady Coughlan, Hayes is a member of the Labour Party and is the Chairman of the non-existent St. Mary's (paper) Branch of that Party.

A recent circular letter was sent by Hurley in Hayes's name to prospective foreign customers. The letter is interesting and gives some useful information concerning the business "ethics" of WELLTRADE. It states:-

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We offer you a further bonus. Any of our men who may wish to transfer to your own permanent payroll, are available to you after a three month hire trial period. In other words, you can hire the men for three months, and afterwards you may keep the best - send home the rest. We make absolutely no charge for this.

Just inform us what type of men you require. We will send you an immediate quotation and a guarantee. This will cost you nothing and save you time and recruiting costs.

And with this type of labour-only set-up there should be plenty of enquiries about the modern slave market being operated by Hurley.

We expect old-fashioned capitalists to behave in this manner -but what about the members of the "Labour" Party who serve Hurley as "personal assistants" and "Managing Directors"?

Brendan Corish, the leader of the Labour Party, prophesied in 1969 that the "Seventies would be Socialist". We are still a long way from socialism in Ireland, but some of the leading members of the "Labour" Party in Limerick seem to be more familiar with slave-trading than with socialism -- even the St. Vincent de Paul kind advocated by Steve Coughlan.

THE BOUNDARY EXTENSION

THE Southill Tenants! and Residents! Association (S.T.A.R.) believes that the people of Southill, and of Limerick City generally, should take a greater interest in the proposed extension of the borough boundary, as this has a significent bearing on the amount of rates they pay with their rent.

In a submission prepared by the City Manager on behalf of the Limerick Corporation, and sent to the Minister for Local Government, it is proposed to extend the City Boundary to take in areas such as Caherdavin on the Clare side and Dooradoyle and Raheen on the County Limerick Manager of the Li

erick side. This will mean that these areas will have to pay their fair share of the rates for the services they enjoy.

So far, most of the agitation and publicity about this question has been one way. The County Councils of Limerick and Clare have come out strongly against the proposal. The Limerick City Council is by no means united on the matter and a number of Councillors, including Deputy Des O'Malley, have opposed the extension.

The residents of Dooradoyle and Raheen have also held meetings and have written to the local Press totally opposing the City Manager's plan. The opposition of these residents is based mainly on the fact that the boundary extension will mean that they will have to pay higher rates.

The Southill Tenants' and Residents' Association supports the boundary extension and believes the opposition of the County residents to be ill-founded. S.T.A.R. also believes that for far too long these residents have had their rates (and their services) on the cheap, at our expense, while at the same time they are enjoying the advantages of the various City services such as roads, lights, schools, shops and other similar facilities.

GENERAL RUMOUR

HOUSING THE FAMILY

Article 41. 1.2. & 2.1.

"The State therefore guarantees to protect the family in its constitution and authority as the necessary basis of social order and as indispensable to the welfare of the Nation and State.

In particular the State recognises that by her life within the home, woman gives to the State a support without which the common good cannot be achieved.

Now read how our local authorities and politicians respond to these noble ideals. Let us take a close look at a real emergency case as, for example, one concerning the vexed question of housing and the inhumanity of our local officials and public representatives in this field.

November 1974. A widow and her family of four children return to Limerick from England hoping to settle in their native city. She goes through the motions of applying for a local authority house, but to no avail.

Her own relations are (quite understandably) unable to accommodate her and so she is compelled to return to England. Back on the other side of the Channel, her circumstances deteriorate beyond human endurance, and she is forced to return "home" once again.

Being a widow with four children, she finds it difficult to find
even temporary accommodation. In
effect, there is "no room at the
Inn". She applies once more for
local authority housing — and up
to this moment she has not been
given it.

She sets out on the familiar foot-slogging itinerary around to the local "salts-of-the-earth". Her first approach is to Alderman Mick "Dobber" Lipper whose much-publicised concern for all widows is well known (thanks to his journalist friend, Tom Tobin.) In this instance his "concern" brings immed-

iate promises of quick action. "Dobber" is very accomplished in the "Promises Department".

Next on the list is the philanthropic cake-maker, the redoubtable George Edward Russell. Short and sweet came the baker's reply: "I'll do my best."

Limerick's "favourite son",
Big Daddy's gift to the people, the
"bookie's runner" himself, the "Honourable" Thady Coughlan, is the next
port of call for the weary widow.
From him she gets the usual "crap"
-- the impersonal representation to
the Housing Officer (Flan O'Neill).
"I'll do my best", etc., etc.

Thady kicks the ball to Coughlan senior, which results in a letter from Daddy inviting the widow to present herself at his new "dispensary" in O'Malley Park and relate her tale of woe to him in person.

In the meantime, this unfortunate family takes up residence behind the Holy Rosary church in Weston where they stay for five nights exposed to the elements. Their next abode is an old car at the back of O'Malley Park.

Finally, one very kind family, appalled at the sight of children sleeping in an old car, offered to take in the family until such time as the flint-hearted officials woke up to their obligations in this genuine emergency case.

This paper demands instant action. No promises. No crap. But CONSTITUTIONAL JUSTICE for this dreadfully unfortunate widow and her children.
